Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species (CITES)

CITES is an **international agreement** that regulates the trade of endangered species to safeguard them from over-exploitation, by ensuring that any trade of these species is legal and sustainable.


CITES works by subjecting international trade in specimens of selected species to certain controls and regulation requires international co-operation because it crosses borders between countries.

CITES is implemented in the UK(GB) primarily through the **retained Wildlife Trade Regulations**, and domestic **COTES 2018 Regulations**.

CITES legislative reform programme

Vision: For the UK to be an influential global actor, driving sustainable, legal, and safe international trade in wildlife and supporting local communities.

- Opportunity to review and revise the CITES legislation in Great Britain to ensure it is proportionate and fit for purpose.
- Consolidate and rationalise EU-derived legislation to ensure a more coherent legal regime.
- Effective species protection fully reflected and implemented in the UK.



Example proposals

Requirements for Imports of Annex B Specimens

Potential options to streamline the requirement for import permits for Annex B specimens include:

- Extending the use of semi-complete permits to imports for high volume, low risk trade,
- Introduce a species and/or speciescountry combinations list that do not require import permits,
- Utilise import notifications for Annex B imports,
- Remove the requirement for import permits from artificially propagated plants,
- Retaining the existing requirement and ensuring the administrative purposes are proportionate and reflects the relative risk.

Semi-complete Permits


- Scoping options to extend the use of semicomplete permits to include some live Annex B and C specimens and import permits.
- APHA (in consultation with UK CITES Scientific Authorities) would retain discretion on whether to issue semi-complete permits on a case-by-case basis.

CITES reform consultation



- The purpose of the consultation is to seek views on preliminary proposals and policy options for reforming the UK CITES domestic legislation
- Once cross-Government clearances have been secured,
 Defra will advise key stakeholders, including HTA, when the
 12-week public consultation will launch.
- There will be open text and we're keen to hear suggestions for other options or proposals we might not have already included.
